Crime Watch Reporting Procedure by Bryan Simanic WA3UFN

The following will be the procedure for the new <u>Crime Watch</u> program. Since this is something new, the format will probably change as the system develops and

the bugs are worked out.

When a mobile or portable station observes something that they feel should be reported to the police, observe all pertinent info and write it down be sure of things such as license numbers, street locations etc. Remember; who, what, when and where. Most important DO NOT place yourself in jeopardy, relative to the situation you are reporting, that may cause you harm. To initiate the call, transmit: "QRZ, this is (station call) with a Crime Watch report."

Repeat as needed. With this type of call everyone who hears it knows that the station on the air has priority or even emergency traffic that should be picked up immediately by anyone who hears it. The station that answers the call should then write down all the info they get - don't trust your "photographic memory".

The receiving operator should next call the police station whose jurisdiction they feel best covers the area. When you call the police identify yourself by name and that you are an amateur radio operator with a crime watch report. If they request your call, give it to the police. They will have a list of most of the stations in the area, but even if you are not on the list it is no reason for the police to disregard your report. If in doubt, call your local police - don't waste what could be precious few minutes to debate on which agency to call.

Finally, please keep a record of the incidents you are involved in, such as times, what the report was, all stations involved, agency contacted. I need the info for a report that I submit to the

police.

This is a very brief outline of what was presented at the meeting in December. I could not cover everything as completely as I would like in this article. If anyone has any questions or problems, get in touch with me, Bryan, WA3UFN.

As promised, the Quad County Amateur Radio Club sponsored upgrade and novice classes are beginning soon. Both classes will run at the same time in adjoining rooms. They begin on February 6, 1985 (a Wednesday) and will meet every Wednesday night after that until about mid-May. Classes begin promptly at 6:30 PM and end promptly at 9:00 PM.

The novice class will start at ground zero and will cover all code, theory, and regulations necessary to pass the current Novice class examination. The exam will be administered near the end of the course to those wishing to take it.

The upgrade class is aimed at licensed amateurs who wish to upgrade to Technician, General, and Advanced class licenses. Extra class material will be

included if there is a demand for it. Basic Novice class knowledge is assumed. The upgrade class will cover theory and regulations, only. No CW will be taught. The upgrade class will end in time for the next scheduled Amateur license examination session to be held in DuBois by the QCARC.

All those who have already expressed an interest in these classes have been contacted directly by mail. There is room for a few more in each group. Please pass the word around about these classes. These are the last ones to be taught until late

in 1985.

The classes are free of charge whether you are a QCARC member or not. There will some study materials to be purchased that you will be hard pressed to do without. The classes -- both novice and upgrade -- meet every Wednesday at 6:30 PM starting February 6, 1985 in rooms C105/C106 at the DuBois Area Senior High School. See you there?
